<b>The Story of Two Doctors</b> - Sudha Murthy			
<p>My sister is a doctor in a government hospital. She works very long hours. Often she has to do night duty, which can be very exhausting. Once, after working for twenty-four hours and performing many operations, she came home late and very tired. Just then, the hospital called her for another emergency operation. She was about to leave immediately. Seeing her tired face, I said, 'I agree patients are very important to doctors. But for the last twenty-four hours, you were in the hospital. You are also a human being; you too, need rest. You can tell somebody else to do this operation. Why don't you rest now?'</p> <p>She smiled and replied, 'There are many doctors along with me who are working equally hard. They also require rest. I am the senior-most doctor, so I must lead the team. In the larger interest of the people, you must sacrifice your personal pain. Don't you remember the story of anaesthesia?' Saying this she went away.</p> <p>I then remembered the story she had told. My sister had narrated it to me some years ago. To what extent this story is true I don't know. But it is an interesting one.</p> <p>Many years ago, in England, there was a father-and-son pair who were doctors. The father was very famous and innovative, and the son was young and enthusiastic. In those days there was no concept of anaesthesia and whenever a patient was to be operated on, chloroform was given.</p> <p>The senior doctor did many experiments and developed a medicine, which when injected in the area where the operation was to be done, made only that part numb. There was no need to make the patient unconscious. Today we call this local anaesthesia.</p> <p>He was convinced by adding different chemicals that his medicine was effective. But there was one problem. No one would volunteer for the experiment. Without experimenting on a human being, this medicine could not be released in the market.</p>			

	<p>Now, the doctor's son had six fingers on his left hand. One day, he suggested to his father, 'Father, I know your medicine is very good. You can inject it into my sixth finger and remove it through an operation. Anyway, I wanted to remove that finger. Let us do this operation in front of other doctors. No man can stand the pain of surgery without anaesthesia. When they see my face, they will understand that your medicine has worked and I am not experiencing any pain.'</p> <p>The suggestion was very good. The father conveyed a message to the members of the Academy of Medical Science, who were the final authority for allowing this medicine to be used in public.</p> <p>On the day of the operation many scientists, doctors and other public figures assembled to watch the effect of this miracle injection. The father injected the medicine to the finger and said, 'Now I will start the operation. You can observe the patient's face.' There was a smile on the young man's face. The operation was performed and was a success. Throughout, the smile remained on the son's face. Everybody was amazed and congratulated the senior doctor for his work.</p> <p>After they left, the father had tears in his eyes. He hugged his son and started crying uncontrollably. 'Sorry, my son, I knew what pain you were undergoing during the operation, you never showed it to the public.'</p> <p>In his hurry and tension before the operation, the father forgot to add the fourth chemical. Because of that the injection was not at all effective. There was uncontrollable pain during the operation. However, the son realised that his father had forgotten something and if he showed his pain his father's experiment would fail. He knew how hard his father had worked to develop this medicine and that it was effective. It was unfortunate that it was not working at that moment. In the middle of the operation, the father also realised the fourth chemical was missing and the medicine was not working. But he was unable to tell this in public. He knew his son was suffering despite the smile on his face. That is why, when everyone left, he broke down crying.</p> <p>The son consoled his father. 'Father, don't worry. For the welfare of others, I controlled my own pain.' I'm not sure if the story is true, but in my sister's and her colleagues' dedication, I saw a glimpse of the sacrifices people in the medical profession make.</p> <p><u>Glossary:</u> Numb - unable to feel Anaesthesia - A medicine that prevents pain during surgery</p>
