- 4. Thomas Mann "Seldom did art work so like nature". In the light of this statement about Leo Tolstoy, analyse Realist Fiction and its scope and breadth to examine and mirror life and attitudes of a particular society, with special reference to Anna Karenina.
- 5. How do myths and legends contribute to the richness of texture in world literature, especially through its referential mode? Discuss in detail with special reference to Ovid's Metamorphosis.
