Such analytical skills enabled me to reach the level where I am today," she said. She thanked all her profe-

er, Dr Subramanian Swamy. Lutz Grace, Geography teacher for the past 26 years, said, "She participated in many extracurricular activities like literary meeting, debate and oratorical competition and stood first in many.'
