 - 1. Discuss how Charlotte Perkins Gilman's "Yellow Wallpaper" becomes a metaphor for women's discourse.
 - 2. Alice Walker's essay "In Search of Our Mother's Gardens," "starts where women must begin: various types of oppression by men, a woman's response directed to men rather than to other women and the silence that locks a women's potential in stasis." Discuss.
 - 3. "The weight, the pace, the stride of a man's mind produce a male literary style against which Woolf defines a female style of unity." Discuss.
 - 4. In <u>Jane Eyre</u>, Charlotte Bronte seems to offer a clear expression of woman's self-assertion. Discuss.
 - 5. Examine how Judith Wright employs imagery, metaphor, alliteration and biblical illusion to make woman's subjectivity central to her poem, "Eve to her Daughters".
 - 6. Antoinette Cosway, the white West Indian Woman of Jean Rhys' <u>Wide Sargasso</u>
 <u>Sea</u> has come to stand for a form of "native" resistance to English patriarchal power. Discuss.
 - 7. In "Caged Bird", Maya Angelou describes her efforts to adapt to the role of a young black girl, the painfully humorous failures, and the gradual realisation of how to transcend the restrictions. Substantiate with instances from the text.
 - 8. Adrienne Rich in her poetry tries to give birth to "a recognizable, autonomous self, a creation in poetry and in life." Examine "Snapshots of a Daughter in Law" against this statement.
 - III. Critically analyse ONE of the following passages with reference to theme and strategy. (1x15=15)
 - You, once a belle in Shreveport,
 With henna-colored hair, skin like a peach bud,
 Still have your dresses copied from that time,
 and play a Chopin prelude

called by Cortot: "Delicious recollections float like perfume through the memory."

Your mind now, moldering like wedding-cake heavy with useless experience, rich with suspicion, rumor, fantasy, crumbling to pieces under the knife-edge of mere fact. In the prime of your life.

I went to my window, opened it, and looked out. There were the two wings b. of the building; there was the garden; there were the skirts of Lowood; there was the hilly horizon. My eye passed all other objects to rest on those most remote the blue peaks; it was those I longed to surmount; all within their boundary of rock and heath seemed prison ground, exile limits. I traced the white road winding round the base of one mountain, vanishing in a gorge between two; how I longed to follow it farther! I recalled the time when I had travelled that very road in a coach; I remembered descending that hill at twilight; an age seemed to have elapsed since the day which brought me first to Lowood and I had never quitted it since. My vacations had all been spent at school: Mrs. Reed had never sent for me to Gateshead; neither she nor any of her family had ever been to visit me. I had no communication by letter or message with the outer world: school-rules, school-duties, school-habits and notions, and voices, and faces, and phrases, and costumes, and preferences, and antipathies... such was what I knew of existence. And now I felt that it was not enough; I tired of the routine of eight years in one afternoon. I desired liberty; for liberty I gasped; for liberty I uttered a prayer; it seemed scattered on the wind then faintly blowing. I abandoned it and framed a humbler supplication; for change, stimulus: that petition, too, seemed swept off into vague space: "Then, I cried, half desperate, "grant me at least a new servitude!"
